

Paying The Price: College Costs, Financial Aid, And The Betrayal Of The American Dream





Synopsis

If you are a young person, and you work hard enough, you can get a college degree and set yourself on the path to a good life, right? A Not necessarily, says Sara Goldrick-Rab, and with Paying the Price, she shows in damning detail exactly why. Quite simply, college is far too expensive for many people today, and the confusing mix of federal, state, institutional, and private financial aid leaves countless students without the resources they need to pay for it. A Drawing on an unprecedented study of 3,000 young adults who entered public colleges and universities in Wisconsin in 2008 with the support of federal aid and Pell Grants, Goldrick-Rab reveals the devastating effect of these shortfalls. Half the students in the study left college without a degree, while less than 20 percent finished within five years. The cause of their problems, time and again, was lack of money. Unable to afford tuition, books, and living expenses, they worked too many hours at outside jobs, dropped classes, took time off to save money, and even went without adequate food or housing. In many heartbreaking cases, they simply left schoolâ "not with a degree, but with crippling debt. A Goldrick-Rab combines that shocking data with devastating stories of six individual students, whose struggles make clear the horrifying human and financial costs of our convoluted financial aid policies. A America can fix this problem. In the final section of the book, Goldrick-Rab offers a range of possible solutions, from technical improvements to the financial aid application process, to a bold, public sectorâ "focused â œfirst degree freeâ • program. Whatâ ™s not an option, this powerful book shows, is doing nothing, and continuing to crush the college dreams of a generation of young people.

Sara Goldrick-Rab delves into understanding the college affordability crisis in a manner that both humanizes and emphasizes. College is expensive, but we know that. What we don't know is how students cope with the cost - what measures they take and how those measures affect the students' experience. Not only does Sara outline the problem well, but she does so in a way that is truly accessible (and enjoyable) for any person to read. I highly recommend this book - especially for people with an interest (however broad) in higher education.

I read this in preview and quite enjoyed it; the interviews with students really bring home how our students are struggling in so many ways, and the complexity and (frequent) unfairness of our financial aid system doesn't meet their needs. The book is a great reminder of why it's so very important to work toward adequately funded, universally affordable public higher education -- the existing system just isn't serving many of our students very well.

As she has done consistently in her career as one of the most knowledgeable and insightful experts on the need to change our system of financing higher education, Sara Goldrick-Rab sorts through the complexity of this issue in ways that bring instant understanding of why the system must change. Whether its personal, poignant stories of students caught up in the system or comprehensive, rigorous data to support her arguments on how and why the system must be transformed, Paying the Price will convince its readers in an instant to sign up for the revolution that is underway. When the history of the free college tuition movement is written Sara will hold a place of honor as a stalwart champion of the cause and this book will be part of her legend.

This carefully researched and well-written book is a must read for policymakers, educational leaders, and others charged with maintaining the integrity of our higher education system as an instrument of opportunity.
