

Shultz, who has studied Gettysburg for decades and walked every yard of its hallowed ground, uses official reports, letters, diaries, and other accounts to meticulously explain how Hunt and his officers and men worked tirelessly that night and well into July 3 to organize a lethal package of orchestrated destruction to greet Leeâ TMs vaunted infantry in an effort that would be hailed by many historians as â ceThe High Water Mark of the Confederacy.â • The war witnessed many large scale assaults and artillery bombardments, but no example of defensive gunnery was more destructive than the ring of direct frontal and full-flank enfilading fire Huntâ ™s batteries unleashed upon Leeâ ™s assaulting columns.
